1864

President Abraham Lincoln signs federal legislation, which establishes the "Yosemite

> Grant." This is the first time the U.S. government set aside land for use as a park.



Yosemite becomes a national park.


1906

On the morning of April 18, an earthquake, with an estimated magnitude of 7.9, strikes San Francisco, claiming the lives of more than 3,000 people.



1913

On August 5, California Representative John Raker introduces a bill to authorize the construction of a dam in the Hetch Hetchy Valley. The House passes the bill September 3. The Senate passes it December 2. President Woodrow Wilson signs the bill into law December 19.



Water delivery to San Francisco begins.

1934

1919 Construction begins on the O'Shaughnessy Dam.

1882

The San Francisco and Tuolumne Water Company of Sonora first identifies the Tuolumne River in the Hetch Hetchy Valley as a potential water source.





1901

San Francisco Mayor James Phelan files a claim with the federal government for the use of water from the Tuolumne River but is denied.

1908

Secretary of the Interior James Garfield approves a new claim filed by the city. Representative Julius Kahn introduces a joint resolution to give San Francisco jurisdiction over the valley. The House holds hearings that December, but the resolution fails.

1916

Congress creates the National Park Service.
